Picking the right puppy

Very often when I go to see a client who is experiencing problems with their young dog, I will ask how they went about choosing their pet. The response is often "I didn't choose my puppy, he chose me"; when they arrived their puppy was the one that pushed the others out of the way and launched itself onto the owner. However, if they had asked the breeder about the puppy, it is likely he was the first to the food bowl, was bigger and stronger than the others because, right from when he was born, he always rooted out and suckled from the mother's most lucrative inguinal teat. A good breeder would already have recognised this puppy as the most dominant and boldest in the litter. This choice of ownership, having been made by the dog and not the human, is normally just the first of many other decisions that the dog will make instead of the other way around.

So what is it you want to look for when visiting a litter? Most owners say they want a well mannered and easily manageable family pet. Good breeders will already recognise the differing characteristics of the puppies and, in an ideal world the breeder having assessed your domestic environment, will be looking to match the right puppy to you.

However, there have been various tests designed to evaluate puppies for specific types of work as well as tests to select those most likely to be good family pets. For example, a strong/bold dominant personality would be suitable for police work rather than a pet. Below are a series of tests you may find helpful when looking to pick your puppy from the litter.

1. Social attraction - pop the puppy on the floor in the middle of the room, attract its attention and encourage it to approach in a different direction from where it entered the area (getting it to come to you). The puppy's readiness to approach, the manner and body posture it displays and attitude to you, should all be taken into account. Coming readily, tail up, jumping up and gnawing your hands indicate this dog has a very strong personality. Coming very hesitantly, tail tucked in, possibly submissively urinating indicates this puppy is very submissive and sensitive. Choose the pup that shows confidence, its bottom may wiggle from side to side as it approaches, and it may lick your hand once it comes to you (avoid the puppy that is biting or mouthing you).

2. Following - having stroked the puppy for coming to you, now walk away, see how readily the puppy follows. A strong personality will follow readily, even getting under your feet and may even attempt to bite them as you move. The very submissive pup will have to be coaxed and is likely to follow in fits and starts. It may roll onto its back each time you stop or bend down to stroke it. Look for the puppy that is happy to follow, yet not chasing or tugging at your clothes/tripping you up etc.

3. Restraint - very gently roll the puppy onto its back, hold it there for approximately 30 seconds. You are looking at what happens (e.g.) does the puppy fiercely struggle or try to bite you? Is there a little struggle with no biting, or even no resistance at all? Choose the puppy that struggles just a little or offers no resistance, you may even have some licking of your hand.

4. Social dominance - the head, neck, and shoulder regions are a sensitive and dominant area. Watch two unknown dogs meet in the park and you will often see a paw or the chin of the slighter higher ranking dog being placed across the withers of the other. So, crouch down, stroke the puppy fairly firmly from the head down over the withers, and continue to do this for about 30 seconds. If the puppy growls and tries to reverse this interaction by jumping up, this shows you it has a strong personality. If the puppy collapses into a heap even squirts urine, it is really submissive. Look for the puppy that after the stroking has finished, it just walks off ignoring the whole proceedings.

5. Elevation dominance - bend over and form a cradle with your hands under the belly of the puppy, gently lift it a few inches off the floor, hold it in that position for about 30 seconds. This puts you in total control and the puppy with no control. The manner in which the puppy accepts or resists helps determine their personality. Look for the puppy who may struggle just a little, however, flops into your hands - and may even give you a lick.

By watching the interaction of the littermates, you will be able to determine the best personality suited to you. Look for the puppy that is playful, yet happy to be rolled around on its back by its siblings, or snoozing away in the middle of the play without a care in the world!

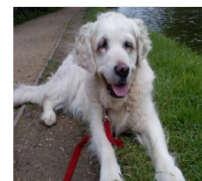
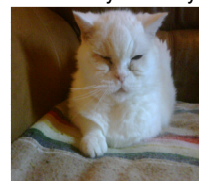
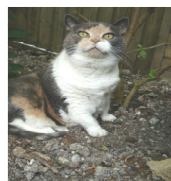

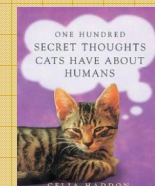
And sad farewells...

Paws for thought



Ever wondered why your cat eats grass? Here's three common cat behaviours explained to help you understand your feline friend.

A Purring cat is not necessarily a happy cat. Cats purr when in pain, distressed or giving birth. Cats in pain purr when approached by people; this suggests cats purr to show they're friendly and approachable - ready to be comforted or

helped. Kittens purr to communicate to its mother that it's well and content.

Kneading is when a cat extends and retracts its claws, this usually happens when resting on its owner's lap. This behaviour comes from kittenhood; kittens knead their mother while suckling to make the milk flow more freely. Adult cats do this when they feel safe and content. If a cat dribbles or sucks at the owners' clothes whilst kneading or purring, this is an indication that the cat may have been taken from its mother too early.

Eating grass often occurs when your cat needs to clean out its stomach by vomiting (e.g. get rid of fur balls). If your cat doesn't have access to grass, house plants or anything similar will be eaten! It's been said that cats eat grass to obtain Folic Acid, something that cats need in small quantities for its well-being.

WTD in the media

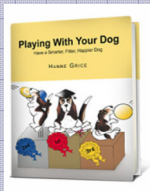
